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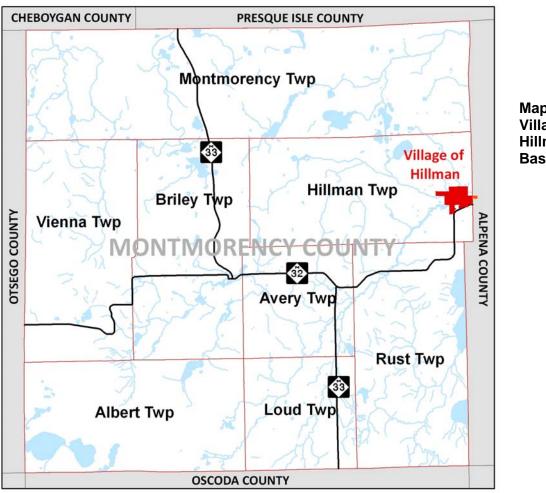

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### **Chapter 1 – Community Description**

#### **Regional Location**

Village of Hillman is located along the eastern border of Montmorency County. The County is located in the northeastern lower peninsula of Michigan. The adjacent map shows the location of the Village. The eastern boundary of the Village extends into Alpena County. Hillman Township borders the western part of the Village and Green Township in Alpena County borders the eastern side. The Village of Hillman covers an area approximately one and three-fourths square miles.

#### Social Characteristics

#### **Population**

There has been a steady growth in population within Montmorency County's municipalities between 1980 and 2000 (see **Table 1.1**, below). The Village of Hillman was the fastest growing community from a percentage standpoint between 1980 and 1990. From 1990-2000 the percent of growth dropped significantly to 6.5 percent growth.

#### **Disability Status**

Data in **Table 1.2**. gives an estimate of how many persons with disabilities reside in Montmorency County. The 2000 U.S. Census found 26.3 percent of the population between 21-64 years of age have some type of disability, over 8 percent higher than the State as a whole. Forty-four percent of the population 65 years and older have a disability, comparable to the State as a whole. Over 60 percent of the elderly population in the Village of Hillman had a disability. This is attributed to a large nursing home in the community.

#### Households

Housing is both a quality of life issue and an economic factor. The Village has been active in working towards a better overall housing stock. A range of housing types have been constructed over the last 15 years. Existing housing stock has also been improved. New construction has occurred as in-fill development within the Village and a new up-scale subdivision along the Thunder Bay River. If the Village is to continue as a viable population center in the county and receive the benefits of its past and future efforts, additional new housing, as well as renovated housing, must be encouraged.

#### Housing Characteristics

Housing characteristics for Montmorency County are found in **Table 1.3**. Most notably, in all of the county's municipalities, except the Village of Hillman, a large percentage of the housing units are not occupied year round. This is because of the large numbers of seasonal housing units found throughout the county. As a result this information supports previous conclusions that Montmorency County has a very large population of part-time residents, which can cause increased demands

on community services during certain times of the year. The majority of homes in the Village of Hillman (53.5%) exist as family homes, with 133 households having members under the age of 20 (Census, 2000).

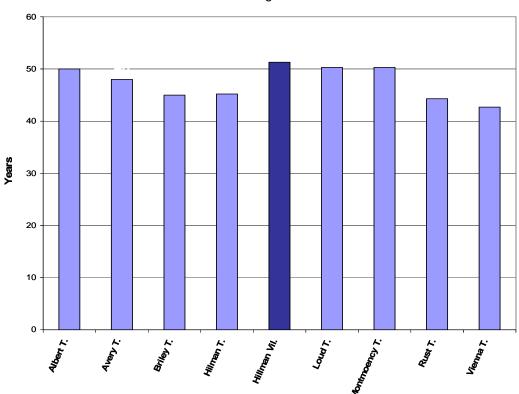
#### Housing Occupancy

On a countywide basis, some 86.1 percent of the housing units are owner occupied. In Montmorency and Vienna Townships this figure exceeds 91 percent. Throughout the county, both owner and renter vacancy rates are fairly low, with the renter occupancy rate in the Townships of Loud, Rust and Vienna recorded at zero.

#### <u>Age</u>

Not surprisingly, the median age of residents in Montmorency County in 2000 was 47.0 years. This is much higher than the State's figure of 35.5 years (see **Figure 1.1**). All of the county's municipalities had older median age figures than the State. Vienna Township recorded the youngest median age in the county of 42.7 years, while the Village of Hillman recorded the oldest figure of 51.3 years. The higher median age in Montmorency County is likely attributed to younger adults moving to other places for education and employment, and the County

being a retirement community. The county's median age, during the summer months is actually even higher than shown, due to the large numbers of elderly seasonally residents.

Although Montmorency County, as a whole, has a large concentration of senior citizens, age distribution data shows that higher concentrations of children are found in the Townships of Albert, Briley, and Hillman. Albert, Briley and Hillman Townships also have relatively high numbers of young adults (20 to 24 years old). High concentrations of adults in their middle years (25 to 44 years) are found in Albert, Avery, Briley, Hillman and Montmorency Townships. Communities with higher numbers of older adults (45 to 64 years) are the Townships of Albert, Avery, Briley, Montmorency and Hillman. High concentrations of senior citizens are found in Albert Township, Hillman Township and Montmorency Township. **Table 1.4** shows the age distribution of the population by community.

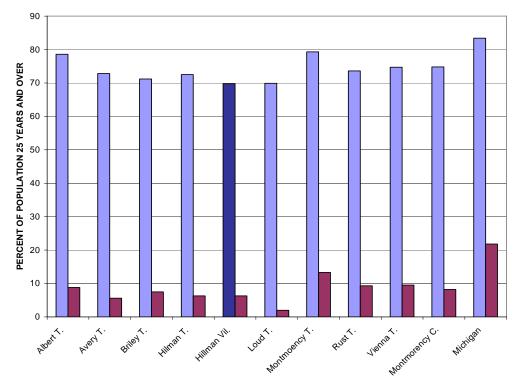

#### **School Enrollment and Education Attainment**

Data found in **Figure 1.2**, shows that Montmorency County had a lower percentage of residents holding a high school diploma (no post secondary training) that the State as a whole. The State had a greater percentage of persons holding both a high school diploma and a college degree, than did the county. The county's lower college graduation rate is due, in part, to the lack of higher educational employment opportunities in the area. Within the county, Montmorency and Albert Townships had the higher percentages of college graduates. This likely is attributed to the recreational/lake front development and the higher numbers of retired persons. Approximately 70 percent of the population in the Village had a high school diploma and six percent had a college degree.

#### Labor Force and Employment Trends

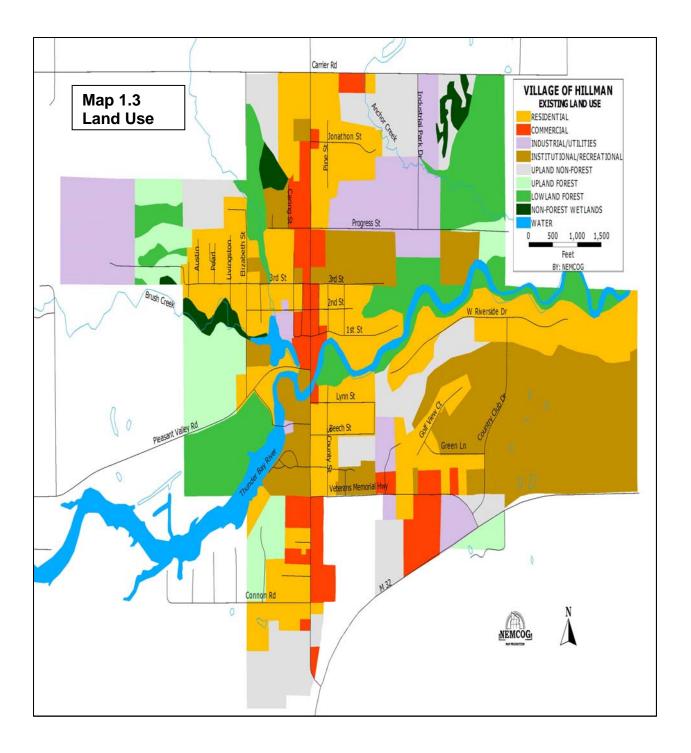
According to the 2000 U.S. Census, the number of persons 16 years and over living in the Village was 583. Of this number, 224 were classified as in the labor force, with 191 employed and 33 unemployed. **Table 1.5** shows employment by occupation for persons residing in the Village.

#### Physical Characteristics

#### Land Use and Zoning

This section presents information on both the types and location of existing land uses in the Village. The process identifies both urban built-up land uses such as residential and commercial, along with natural land cover types like forests and wetlands. As a result the map is a hybrid that combines land cover and land use. The urban build-up land use is predominately residential. This includes both older neighborhoods and new residential development associated with the golf course (**Map 1.3**). Commercial development includes the central downtown business district north of the Thunder Bay River and newer highway commercial development along M-32. The industrial/utility land use category includes the industrial park, other manufacturing businesses and the sewage treatment facility on the west side of town. The second largest category, institutional/recreational, includes parks, golf courses, public buildings, churches, and schools.



#### <u>Topography</u>

Montmorency County owes its topographical formation to the glacial action of the Pleistocene Epoch which ended approximately 10,000 years ago. The County consists of plains, rolling plains and hilly lands. The area Hillman occupies is part of an old lake plain that covers the northeastern portion of the County. The land in this area is level or gently rolling, but contains numerous wet swales, ponds and higher patches of sand. Elevations range from 700 to 900 feet in the Hillman area.

#### Water Resource

The chief source of water for Hillman is the Thunder Bay River, which flows through the Village from the southwest to the northeast. Brush Creek, a major tributary, intersect the Thunder Bay River near the center of town. Both Thunder Bay River and Brush Creek are controlled by dams, and the impoundment on Brush Creek is another important water resource for the Village.

Groundwater is generally available in adequate quantities throughout Montmorency County. Four inch wells in glacial drift will yield 10 to 15 gallons of water per minute. Availability of groundwater in bedrock is not very productive, since only 10 or less gallons per minute can be expected from bedrock throughout the county. Depth to groundwater averages 30 to 40 feet.

#### Fish & Wildlife

The Thunder Bay River supports a healthy and diverse warm water fishery. A 1998-1999 study (Inland Study #662) by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources found thirteen species of fish inhabit the river. A list of species found in Hillman area lakes and rivers includes bass, pike, walleye, perch, trout and various "pan fish".

#### <u>Climate</u>

The Village of Hillman has a continental type climate, characterized by larger temperature ranges than in areas at the same latitude, but nearer the Great Lakes. The area is somewhat sheltered by a higher plateau region to the west; thus the lake effect which impacts much of Michigan is less noticeable here. Lake effect experience by Hillman is usually limited to increased cloudiness and snowfall during the late fall and early winter. Prevailing winds for the area are south-westerly, averaging eight miles per hour. The strongest wind speed on record was 43 miles per hour in April 1963. Average relative humidity varies from 51% for May to 74% for December, with an annual average of 61%. Percent possible sunshine averages 49% annually.

Summers are dominated by moderately warm temperature with an average eight days exceeding 90 degree Fahrenheit. The highest record temperature for the

area was 104 degrees on July 13, 1936. Minimum temperatures reflect the influence of the lakes. Hillman experiences an average 176 days at 32 degrees or lower and an average of 23 days at 0 degrees or lower. None of the years on record stayed above 0 degrees for the entire year, and the lowest recorded temperature was -45 degrees on February 9, 1934.

In Hillman, the average date of the last freezing temperature in spring is June 2, and the average date of the first freezing temperature in fall is September 16. The growing season is approximately 106 days per year.

Precipitation is well distributed throughout the year with the growing season, April to September, receiving an average of 65% of the annual total. While drought occurs periodically, the Palmer Drought Index indicates drought conditions are rarely extreme for Hillman.

#### Utility Services

Alpena Power supplies the Village with its electricity and Presque Electric and Gas Cooperative supplies the natural gas. Verizon is the only phone company in the area. Cellular phone service is provided by a number of different carriers. The Village provides water and sewer.

#### Transportation Systems

A substantial network of roads is a critical component in any community, not only to enable people to move efficiently to and from employment, shopping and recreational sites, but to provide the efficient flow of goods and services throughout the region. Map 1 shows transportation routes for Montmorency County. The main traffic artery for Hillman is State Highway M-32. Traveling east on M-32, the City of Alpena lies on 23 miles from the Village, and this route is used by many local residents for commuting to employment or shopping. Traveling west, M-32 leads from Hillman 16 miles to the unincorporated community of Atlanta, and 48 miles to the City of Gaylord. Also traveling in a westerly direction from Hillman, County Road 624 connects with M-33, providing passage to Presque Isle County.

Transportation routes within the Village of Hillman are mainly provided by a gridlike network of streets, as shown in Map 1.2. In 1994, M-32 was rerouted through the old M-32 roadway to provide easier access to the Village. State Street (a continuation of Country Road 451) forms the Village's central northsouth thoroughfare, while M-3 approximates the Village's southeastern limits. The Thunder Bay River bisects Hillman, flowing through the heart of town in a southwesterly to northeasterly direction. State Street and the river divide Hillman into four quadrants and are significant resources and physical barriers to movement within the Village. Transportation bus services are provided to Hillman in a limited capacity by Thunder Bay Transportation from Alpena. Thunder Bay currently has a bus that runs five days per week between Atlanta and Alpena and between Hillman and Alpena. The elderly and handicapped receive priority seating on theses buses, however the general public may ride the buses if there is room. Montmorency County Council on Aging currently has five volunteers who will provide transportation via their private vehicles to those who need transport for doctor's appointments and other purposes. The volunteers are paid a small donation for their services. A taxicab company located in the City of Alpena also services the Hillman area.

There are no regularly scheduled airline services available in Montmorency County. Within the County are three small airports located in Hillman, Atlanta and Lewiston. Hillman Airport, located northwest of the Village, can accommodate small, private airplane traffic. Commercial service is available in Alpena County. Alpena County Regional Airport is located just west of the City of Alpena on M-32. Daily airline service is available between Alpena and Detroit Metro Airport, with connecting flights from that point. Charter airplane services are also available from the Alpena Airport, as well as air freight services. Other larger airports within the area offer a wide variety commercial flights and other service, include Pellston Regional Airport in Pellston and the Cherry Capital Airport in Traverse City.

#### <u>Media</u>

Newspaper coverage is provided by the Montmorency Tribune, a weekly paper that provides local coverage for the entire county. Newspaper coverage is also provided by The Alpena News. The Alpena News is a daily paper that provides local, state, national and world coverage for Alpena, Alcona, Hillman and Presque Isle Counties.

Residents of the Village of Hillman receive full television coverage, both network and cable stations. WKBK is located in Alpena. Sunrise Communications provides cable to the Village. A wide array of radio stations can be received in the Village. Radio stations include WHSB FM/Bay 108, WATZ AM/FM, WHAK FM, and WKJZ FM. All radio stations are based out of Alpena.

#### Chapter 2 – Administrative Structure

#### Village of Hillman

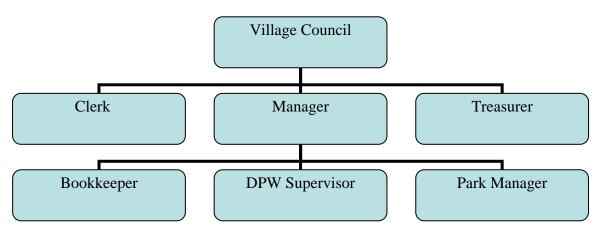
#### Standard Operating Procedures

The Village of Hillman operates under an administrative structure consisting of a President, Clerk, Treasurer, Manager and four Trustees. Except for the manager, the positions are elected by registered voters of the Village. The elected offices for Village President, Clerk, and Treasurer are two year terms and the Trustees are four year terms. Bylaws adopted by the Village Council determine the order of business and method of conducting regular Village business. For issues that require a vote to make a determination, a simple majority of the Village Council is required.

Parks and recreation facilities are under the direct control of the Village Council. The Village of Hillman is directly responsible for creating the Recreation Plan.

#### Parks & Recreation Staff

The Village of Hillman does not employ an official director for the parks program. The Village employs a seasonal part-time park manager and a seasonal parttime laborer position. The parks and recreational facilities are under the direct control of the Village Council. The Parks and Recreation Department is overseen by the Village Manager, and day to day operations are the responsibility of full-time Parks Manager and a part-time seasonal employee.

Funds for maintaining or improving facilities or for acquiring new facilities and property are appropriated by the Village Council from general funds and placed in Parks and Recreation budget. The annual projected budget for operations, maintenance, and capital improvements are detailed in the budget.

#### Relationships with other Agencies/Groups

Whenever possible, the Village of Hillman pools resources with other agencies and organizations when undertaking community projects. This has the dual effect of maximizing resources while at the same time benefiting a greater share of the population. An example of this type of cooperation is the construction of the Brush Creek Gristmill. This was a joint project with Northern Innovative Communities, the Village of Hillman and the local residents.

At the present time the Village of Hillman is cooperating with several other agencies on a variety of projects and activities. Listed below are some of these cooperative efforts along with the partnering agency:

- Brush Creek Grist Mill and the Village of Hillman work cooperatively to continue to maintain and improve the Mill and museum.
- The Village of Hillman has a 99 year lease with the Hillman Little League for the Youth Sports Complex, featuring high school regulation ball field and soccer field.
- Cooperation between the Village and Township is crucial in the efficient operation of several recreational facilities within the Village. Tournament Park is located within the Village, but is owned by Hillman Township. A bike path owned by the Village runs from Tournament Park west along Progress Street to State Street.
- The Alpena to Hillman snowmobile trail heads west along Progress Street from Tournament Park is maintained by the Alpena Snowmobile Association.

# **Chapter 3 – Recreational Inventory**

#### Village of Hillman Recreational Properties

#### Brush Creek Mill



The property and building are owned by the Village, but the Mill is operated by the Brush Creek Mill Board. The green-built Mill is air tight and features solar power, water wheel power and is working towards geo-thermal heating. The Mill houses the museum, local crafts and art for sale, an educational room and a meeting room. The Mill organizes several annual events that draw

people to the Mill and the Village such as live music, Mill River Days, Applefest, Quilt Days and Christmas Tree Festival.

#### Type: Special Use

**Barrier Free Accessibility: 3** – Most of the /park areas meet accessibility guidelines.

#### Brush Creek Mill Area

The lot In front of the Mill is a recreational area that offers picnic tables and benches. Fishing along the river bank is allowed. Wheelchairs can fit up to the picnic tables.



#### Type: Mini-Park

**Barrier Free Accessibility: 2 -** Some of the /park areas meet accessibility guidelines.

#### Emerick Park



This 22 site campground sits on 25 acres within Village limits. The park offers camping, picnicking, playground, two pavilions, boat launch, dock, fishing access and showers and restrooms. Three campsites are paved and meet ADA standards as do the restroom and showers. Some of the picnic tables are handicap accessible.

#### **Type:** Community Park

**Barrier Free Accessibility: 3** – Most of the park areas meet accessibility guidelines.

#### Pineview Park

This 2.8-acre park is located at the behind the Senior Citizen Center on Pineview Court, this Village owned property offers walking paths, foot bridge, benches and shuffleboard.

**Type**: Mini-Park **Barrier Free Accessibility: 3** – Most of the park areas meet accessibility guidelines.

#### **Other Publicly Owned Recreational Properties**

#### Senior Citizens Center

This facility provides meals, meetings, crafts for the Senior Citizens. Exercise and dance classes are open to the public in general. This non-profit facility is run by the Montmorency Commission on Aging and the local board.



**Ownership:** Montmorency Commission on Aging **Type:** Private Recreation Facility **Barrier Free Accessibility: 4** – The entire facility meets accessibility guidelines

#### Tournament Park

This 40-acre park is owned by Hillman Township. It offers three softball fields, a concession stand, a playground and an expanded parking area. A bike path owned by the Village runs from Tournament Park west along E. Progress Street to State Street. A snowmobile trails heads along this route into town in the winter. It is maintained by the Snowmobile Association.

**Ownership:** Hillman Township

**Type:** Neighborhood Park

**Barrier Free Accessibility: 5** – The entire park was developed using the principals of universal design.

#### Tiger Paw Park



Type: Mini-Park

Located in Tournament Park, this community sponsored Boundless Playground is an extraordinary playground where all children, with and without disabilities, can develop essential skills for life as they learn together through play.

**Ownership:** Hillman Township

**Barrier Free Accessibility: 5** – The entire park was developed using the principals of universal design.

#### Hillman Community Center



The 10,000 square foot Community Center is owned and operated by Hillman Township. The Village and Township offices are housed there along with meeting rooms. Roller-skating is the key recreational activity offered. The center is available for wedding receptions, craft shows and organizational dinners (Ducks Unlimited, White

Tails Unlimited, and the Fireman's Ball).

**Ownership:** Hillman Township **Type:** Special Use **Barrier Free Accessibility: 5** – The entire facility was developed using the principals of universal design.

#### Hillman Community School District

The school provides indoor and outdoor recreation opportunities with playgrounds, baseball fields, outdoor basketball courts, track, practice fields, football fields, restrooms, concession stands and a gym. The buildings provide meeting rooms, places for indoor adult recreation and tournaments.



**Ownership:** Hillman Community School District **Type:** School Park **Barrier Free Accessibility: 4** – The entire facility meets accessibility guidelines.

#### Hillman Wright Library



The library is open six days a week offering books, movies and CD's to residents. Computer and internet access is available. Recreational activities include story time for toddlers' ages 1-5 years, arts and crafts for children 5-17 years, and adult arts and crafts classes. The library also has reading and writing clubs.

Ownership: Montmorency County Libraries Type: Special Use Barrier Free Accessibility: 4 – The entire facility meets accessibility guidelines

#### Alpena to Hillman Trail

The Alpena to Hillman Trailhead is in Alpena. It follows state land to Hillman. The trail comes down the side of Progress Street past Tournament Park to State Street. The trail then heads down Caring Street to Pineview Park and back onto state land and other trails. The trail is managed by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. The trail offers opportunities for snowmobiling, and hiking (some sections impassable for mountain bikers)

Ownership: State of Michigan Type: Multi-use Trail Systems

Barrier Free Accessibility: 1. No portions of trail are handicap accessible.

#### Brush Creek Snowmobile Trail

The trailhead is located west of Hillman in the Thunder Bay River State Forest. The trail runs 30 miles to M-33 north of Atlanta. The Alpena to Hillman Trail connects to it southwest of the trailhead. The trail is managed by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. The trail offers opportunities for snowmobiling, and hiking (some sections impassable for mountain bikers).

**Ownership:** State of Michigan

**Type:** Multi-use Trail Systems

Barrier Free Accessibility: 1. No portions of trail are handicap accessible.

#### Recreational Facilities Outside of the Village of Hillman

#### Avery Lake State Forest

This camping facility is located approximately 20 miles southwest of Hillman on M-33. Owned by the State of Michigan, this rustic campground offers 21 campsites, picnic tables, boating, swimming, and fishing.



#### Clear Lake State Park



This state owned park is located 20 miles northwest of Hillman on M-33 in Atlanta, this park offers 200 campsites, electric, restrooms/showers, pavilion, horseshoe courts, playgrounds, picnic areas, swimming, trails, boating and fishing. It meets ADA compliances.

#### Ess Lake State Forest Campground

Located approximately six miles northwest of the Village, this State owned, five acre facility offers rustic camping with 30 campsites, boating, fishing, and swimming.



#### Long Lake Park

This county park is 33 miles northeast of Hillman in Alpena County. The park has camping, electric, water, showers, dump station, swimming, boating, fishing, and hiking, and beach facility with its own parking and picnic sites.

#### Fletcher's Flood Waters

Michigan Department of Natural Resources owns public access for boats on Jack's Landing Road, five miles east of the Village of Hillman.

#### <u>Lake Avalon</u>

Michigan Department of Natural Resources owns public access site with boat launch and beach on County Road 451, five miles north of the Village of Hillman.

#### Long Lake

Michigan Department of Natural Resources owns public access boat launch off North Shore Drive, seven miles north of the Village of Hillman.

#### Grass Lake

Michigan Department of Natural Resources owns public access boat launch, ten miles northwest of the Village of Hillman.

#### Privately Owned Recreational Facilities

#### Jack's Landing Resort

Located seven miles east of the Village of Hillman, it offers restaurant and bar, hotel rooms, 30 campsites with electric, sewer, flush toilets, showers, swimming, playground, boat/canoe rental, fishing bait store, rental cabins, and ice shanty rentals.

# Northern Shore Lodge

Located seven and a half miles north of Village of Hillman, this retreat offers 9 bedrooms and baths, living room, recreation room, kitchen and dining room, swimming, boating and fishing with access to Long and Ess Lakes.





#### Thunder Bay Golf Resort



Located within the Village of Hillman, the 18 hole public golf course includes a Best Western Hotel. Along with golfing, the resort offers elk-viewing sleigh rides with a gourmet dinner, quilt retreats, wine tasting events and murder mystery weekends.

#### Sorenson's Grass Lake Resort

Located 11 miles northwest of Hillman, this resort has cabin rentals, 20 campsites, electric, water, flush toilets, showers, playground, boat or canoe rental, and picnic shelter.



#### Angler's Hideaway



Located on Miller Road west of Hillman on Fletcher's Floodwaters, this facility offers cabins with complete kitchen. There is a fire ring, picnic table, bench and a grill with each cabin. All rentals come with a fishing boat (no motor). It's open through the hunting season and the winter for ice fishing and snowmobiles. Shanty rentals,

bait and tackle are also available.

#### Brown's North Shore Resort

Accommodations consist of 11 modern one and two bedroom cabins, campfire pits, picnic tables and one dock space. Amenities include a tackle store, boat rental. Also known as Charley's Landing.



#### Killion's Landing



Located seven miles southeast of the Village of Hillman, this resort offers modern camp sites, cabins and boat rentals on the shores of Fletcher Pond.

#### <u>Lyon's Landing</u>

Located 12 miles southwest of the Village of Hillman, this facility includes rental kitchenette apartments, mobile homes, and 2 one room cabins, a 5 bedroom house, 2 pontoon boats, 2 fish cleaning stations and 2



playgrounds, boats and motors. There are 75 campsites, many with shade and electrical service.

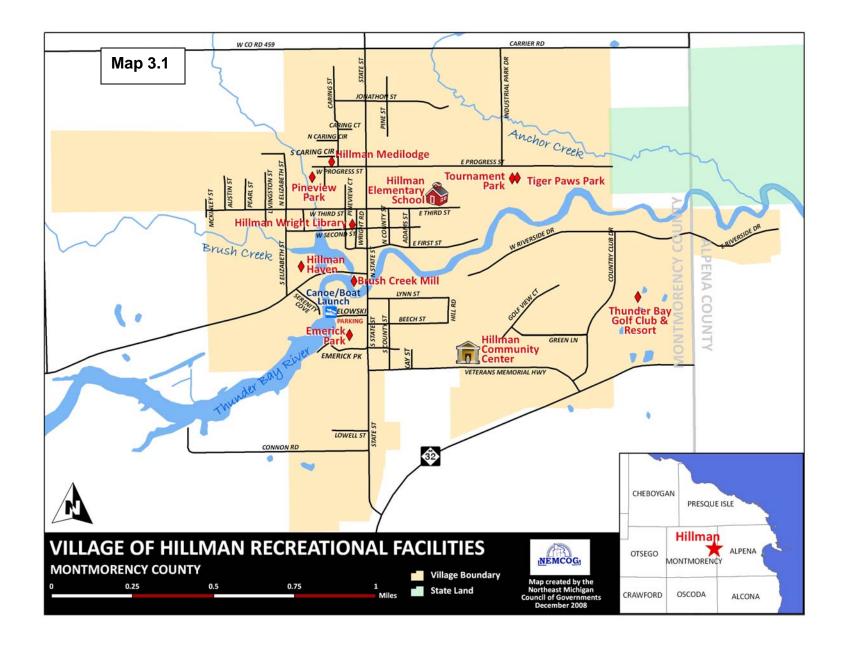
#### **Inventory Procedures**

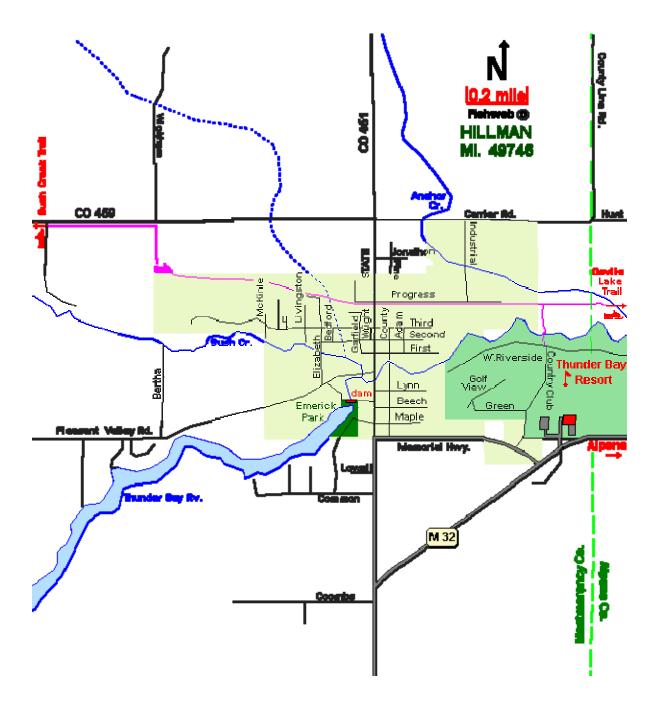

#### Status Report on Grant-Assisted Recreational Facilities

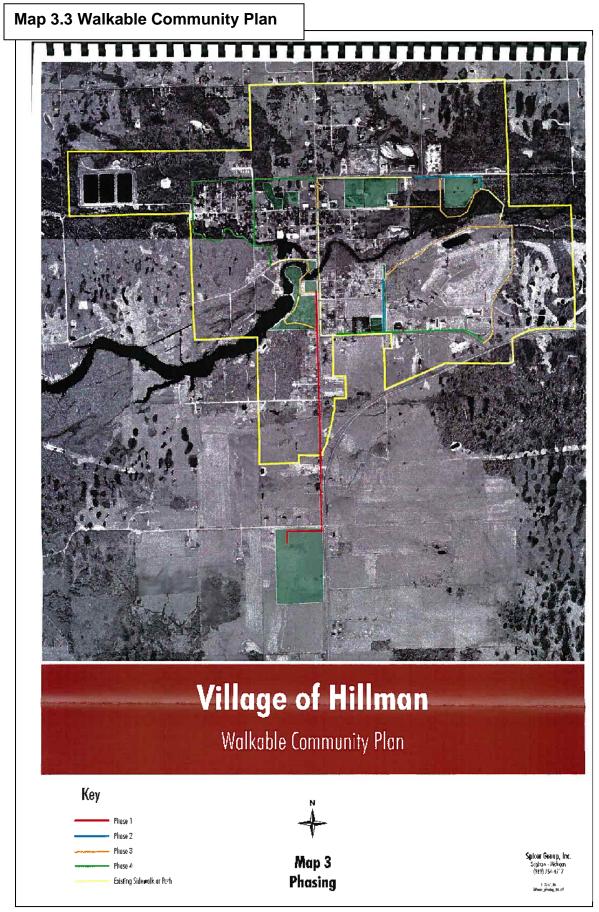

### Chapter 4 – Description of the Planning Process

### Schedule

- October 2008 Laura Ingles of the Northeast Michigan Council of Governments met with the Village Manager to discuss the planning process and to establish a timeline for the completion of the Recreation Plan. Groups with special interest in recreation were asked to participate in the process. Hillman Township was invited to participate in the process. A public input meeting was scheduled for November 6, 2009.
- November 2008 The Montmorency County Tribune, the Alpena News, fliers posted around town and WATZ radio were utilized in promoting the public input meeting. Key stakeholders were invited personally to attend by the Village Manager. Hillman Township representatives were encouraged to attend along with their key recreational stakeholders.

A public input meeting was held November 6<sup>th</sup>, from 7:00 PM until 8:30 PM in the offices of the Village of Hillman. Village and Council representatives and NEMCOG staff were available for public discussion of recreation issues. The group completed assets and needs inventory and prioritized needs.

- December 2008 A working meeting was held December 16, 2009, with the Village Manager to review the work completed on the plan. The Final Draft of the Recreation Plan was presented to the Village Council on December 23, 2008.
- January 2009 The Recreation Plan was available at the Village Offices and on NEMCOG's website from January 5 until February 3, 2009.
- February 2009 On February 17, 2009, at 7:20 PM in the Village of Hillman office, a public meeting was held. Following public input and discussion of public input, the Village of Hillman Council voted to accept the Village of Hillman Recreation Plan.

### Public Input

Although only one person from the public attended the public input session, the village council determined that the results the public survey used in October of 2008 for the Village of Hillman's Strategic Plan will be included as the public input process. This survey included a section focused on recreation needs. The Village Council and NEMCOG met to review the results and to determine goals and objectives for the Village for the next five years.

Low attendance for the public input session was attributed to the numerous public sessions held in Hillman recently for the streetscape, new bridge, strategic and eco-park plans projects. The Village promoted the meeting thoroughly via newspapers, radio and fliers.

### Public Input Results

Participants at the public input session discussed the survey completed by residents for the 2008 Strategic Plan. Survey results were used the basis for the recreation plan with input from the village council.

### Survey Results

# 1) What type of stores/services would you like to see in the Hillman Area that is not currently available?

Generally, people in the area would like more grocery stores and restaurants. Responses include a long list of retail stores and services to accommodate the daily needs of residents. Improvements to infrastructure and services include broadband internet, public safety, medical, farmers market and public drinking water were identified. Respondents showed an interest in improvements to recreation facilities and activities such as skating, ice rinks, community pool and activities for all age groups. New development related to tourism should include marketing, wine tasting, Brush Creek Mill, and resorts.

# 2) Please list specific improvements or changes you would like to see take place in the services listed in Question 10?

The answers apply to services in the Village and surrounding communities. Respondents would like to see improvements to community infrastructure including sidewalks, more defined crosswalks, better drinking water, street repairs, pathways from town to school, and pathways around communities. Service changes include improved training for fire department, more staff for ambulance service, better snow removal, better zoning enforcement, improved police coverage, and improvements to the library. Residents would like to see

façade improvements and consistency to storefronts, seasonal decorations, wayfinding signs, better handicap access into stores, expanded business hours, business recruitment, and more downtown activities

# 3) Do you favor or oppose development of the following industries in the Village of Hillman?

There was no strong opposition to any of the listed development types. In the Village, the percent of respondents opposing types of development were five percent or less. In the Townships percent of respondents opposing tourism and transportation/distribution was 11 percent. Several of the development types had high percentages of "no opinion," which may indicate lack of understanding. If the Village were to pursue these types of development, a community information and outreach program would be appropriate.

# Chapter 5 – Goals & Objectives/Action Plan

### **Goals and Objectives**

Goals and objectives were developed from the public input session, the strategic plan survey and the Village Council.

- 1. Implement the Walk-able Communities Plan.
  - a. Create the Bike Path to/from the Elementary and Junior/Senior High School utilizing the State of Michigan's Safe Routes to School Program.
  - b. Develop a trailhead at the acquired Brush Creek property.
  - c. Enhance the trailhead area with picnic tables, benches, garbage containers, and parking lot.
  - d. Landscape and bank stabilization along Mill Pond.
  - e. Add physical fitness course with different stations along the pathway system.
  - f. Build a footbridge over the Thunder Bay River.
- 2. Continue to enhance Village park properties.
  - a. Add additional parking at Tripp Field.
  - b. Add a town clock and Handicap Accessible picnic tables at the Brush Creek Mill Area.
  - c. Upgrade the shuffle board, paint equipment, add new benches, remove and trim trees at Pineview Park.
  - d. Build a roller hockey court at Emerick Park.
  - e. Improve dock at Emerick Park to meet ADA standards.
  - f. Add campsites to Emerick Park.

- 3. Provide additional community recreational activities.
  - a. Continue to work with the Little League Association to continue developing the Youth Sports Park by adding soccer fields, youth football field, high school regulation ball field, two Little League Regulation fields, and fishing pond.
  - b. Research the development of a Community Theatre.
  - c. Study suitability of nature areas and future pathways.
- 4. Promote the use of Village recreational assets.
  - a. Encourage residents and visitors to make use of existing village recreational assets by bringing about necessary improvements to increase the availability of recreational amenities.
  - b. Partner with other local agencies or the State of Michigan whenever possible.
- 5. Develop a program to promote the Village of Hillman's recreational facilities.
  - a. Establish wayfinding, directional and site signage to direct visitor's to Village recreational facilities.
  - b. Consider developing a brochure and map for the village recreational facilities.

5	Bank stabilization will ensure river bank permanence. Landscaping improvements only enhances community to its residents and visitors.
6	Creates a scenic crossing from the Tripp Field parking lot expansion to the Brush Creek Mill. Creates a safe route while enhancing a positive visitor experience.
7	Improvements and additions to current parking will allow more visitors and residents to enjoy the Mill, Pathway Systems and Emerick Park.
8	Improvement to existing park properties only enhances the community to its residents and visitors.
9	Creating more ADA accessibility allows more residents and visitors to enjoy the recreational facilities.
10	Improvement and expansion of the existing recreational facilities only enhances our community to its residents and visitors
11	Expansion of the existing recreational activities allows more residents and visitors to utilize recreational opportunities.
12	Creating more ADA accessibility docks will allow more residents and visitors to enjoy the recreational facilities.

### **Basis for Action**

The demographics of the Village of Hillman indicate that a majority (53.5%) of the Village exists as family households. 133 households have children under the age of 20; while 57% of the Village residents are over the age of 45. There are 181 disabled residents in the Village of Hillman. Due to the large number of residents who are able to pursue active recreation as well as the high number of households with children and disabled persons, the Village of Hillman must plan recreational facilities that appeal to a wide variety of people. In addition, with the median income of Montmorency County being \$32,055 (2004 Census data), recreation must be fairly affordable.

Due to the fact that there are more developed recreational facilities and more cultural opportunities in the nearby City of Alpena, the Village intends to capitalize on its natural assets to fulfill the needs of outdoor recreation in the community. With the surrounding fishing, camping, snowmobiling and skiing opportunities, the Village of Hillman will lean towards the development of outdoor recreational facilities. Therefore, Village of Hillman intends to develop its outdoor recreation to suit the needs of differing age groups, income levels, and physical abilities of Village residents and visitors.

### Walkable Community

The Village has had a plan completed on developing a walkable community. The residents of the community have voiced their support of having a walkable community.

The plan includes a pathway from downtown out to the Junior/Senior High School. This will be implemented through the Safe Routes to School program. It includes building a trail head with parking across from the Brush Creek Mill complete with picnic tables and landscaping. This will allow visitors and residents surrounding the community to use the pathway system. The pathway system will include physical fitness stops for extra workout opportunities.

A footbridge over the Thunder Bay River will enhance the pathway usability by providing a direct route to additional parking and creating an appealing setting to walk through.

#### Improvements of Existing Recreational Facilities

Improvements and maintenance to current facilities will encourage residents and visitors to continue using them. The Village plans to continue improving recreational opportunities available to its citizens.

Installing a town clock in the Mill Area will increase the sense of community within the Village and surrounding townships. It will add to the visual appeal created by the Mill. The Mill is a gathering place for the Village, so placing the town clock there will only increase the sense of community related to the location.

Adding ADA picnic tables and rebuilding the dock at Emerick Park will benefit the large number of handicap individuals that reside in the Village. This will allow more residents to enjoy the river, fishing and events at the Mill.

Currently the youth play roller hockey in a parking lot. Building a place specific for this activity will help ensure the safety of the youth while they play. With a formal roller hockey field, more residents will be able to take advantage of the activity and participate.

It is the intent of the Village to create recreational activities with appealing aesthetics for its residents and visitors to enjoy. Pleasant aesthetics appeals to larger groups of residents and visitors, so more residents will take advantage of the recreational opportunities the Village has to offer.

#### Wayfinding Signage and Brochures

Many residents and visitors are not aware of the many recreational opportunities available within the Village of Hillman. The Village intends to develop wayfinding signage to direct visitors and residents to the public and private recreational facilities listed in the recreation inventory that are located within the Village limits. This signage will include name, directional and distance information.
